## **RECOMMENDATIONS:**

That Council accepts the report and directs staff to proceed with work on Royal Pines Road not to exceed \$279,622.23.

#### BACKGROUND:

The original road plan for 2020 was revised after RFP submissions came in more than \$600,000.00 over budget. Council approved a plan to negotiate with the lowest bidder a reduction in work that would bring the overall project in line with the budgeted amount.

Unfortunately, the reduction in work required the removal of work to be done to Royal Pines. Council expressed concern about dropping Royal Pines from the list and requested that staff look at what could possibly be done on the road in 2020. Staff stated that some work could take place in 2020 using operational road maintenance funds.

At this time through staff and contractor diligence and favorable road conditions after the winter there is \$219,622.23 remaining in the original budgeted amount. The Township has now been approved compensation for the 2019 high water issues from the province (\$60,000.00).

Staff and the original contractor have investigated what can be accomplished within the original awarded tender.

With the addition of the monies received from the province, and staying within the original RFP, and without changing quoted amounts 2.9 km of Royal Pines Road can be completed this year with the addition of the monies received from the province.

There would be a small portion of the operations budget (\$12,000.00) that would be required for staff to prepare one portion of the road for the contractor. There would be some labour and equipment time also assigned to the project.

The contractor has expressed a willingness to do the work before the end of the summer.

It is the recommendation of staff that Council approves the work and funding for this project that is part of the 2020 budget plan.

With this work complete there will be the remaining 3 km of Royal Pines and the outstanding drainage work on Island View to be carried over to next year. It is advised that the Royal Pines and Island View remaining work will require extensive planning and should be reviewed by a third party.

The Township of North Algona Wilberforce is small seasonal and tourist-oriented community that relies heavily on the ability to safely access and travel provincial Highway 60 that meanders through the centre of the township. Residents and visitors alike depend on safe access and egress from the highway at some of the most populated areas in the township fronting directly on the highway. This is especially true in the hamlet of Deacon on the west end of the Township. There are many seasonal and permanent dwellings as well as several of the township's major businesses.

A large portion of this area has a reduced speed limit of 70 kilometres per hour. The township is appreciative of this reduced zone as it slows traffic in the core of this populated area. It is believed that this has prevented accidents and potentially loss of life.

THAT Council receive Staff Report CSPW.18.068, entitled, "Follow-Up from Letter sent to MTO regarding the Speed Limit West of Thornbury" for their information.

### B. Overview

This Report is presented to provide Council the follow-up correspondence to a letter Council directed Staff to send to the Ministry of Transportation.

## C. Background

The current speed limit on Highway 26 from Landsdown Street to just prior to Peel Street, toward the Town of Meaford, changes from 50 km/h to 70km/h and then increases to 80km/h. On November 15, 2017 the Town of The Blue Mountains Committee of the Whole received correspondence from a resident regarding the proposal for a speed limit change on Highway 26 West at Peel Street to the 10th Line. On November 27, 2017, the Town of the Blue Mountains Council received correspondence from another resident of the Town in response to the request to reduce the speed limit on Highway 26.

On November 27, 2017 Council directed Staff to write a letter (Attachment #1) to the Ministry of Transportation (MTO) in London, requesting the speed limits on Highway 26 between Peel Street and the 10<sup>th</sup> Line in The Blue Mountains be reduced. The certified resolution regarding this recommendation is provided as Attachment #2. In addition, the Town made a deputation in January 2018 to the Ministry of Transportation at the annual Rural Ontario Municipal Association Conference that included requesting this speed reduction.

On August 1, 2018, Staff received a letter from the MTO, Engineering Office Traffic Section (West Region) in response. The letter is dated July 16, 2018 and is provided as Attachment #3. The letter confirms that based on accepted traffic engineering principles and the MTO's review, the existing regulatory speed limit of 80km/h for the section of highway in question is appropriate.

**Speed Limit Change West of Thornbury** 

Dear Mr. Russwurm,

Thank you for the letter regarding the speed limit on Highway 26 at the west end of Thornbury.

When setting speed limits, the Ministry of Transportation considers the geometry of the highway, the amount and type of development adjacent to the highway, collision history and driver expectations.

Research has shown that a lowered speed limit is not likely to reduce vehicle speeds where drivers do not see a reason to slow down. The principles of driver expectation suggest that lower speed limits are associated with built up areas that have numerous accesses to and from the highway.

Ministry staff conducted a field review and a spot speed study along Highway 26 on July 11<sup>th</sup> 2018. The study was within the existing 80 km/h speed zone at the west end of Thornbury to confirm existing operating conditions. In general, it was found that 85 percent of eastbound traffic was travelling below 89 km/h, while 85 percent of westbound traffic was travelling below 86 km/h.

Based on accepted traffic engineering principles, our review confirms that the existing regulatory speed limit of 80 km/h for this section of Highway 26 is appropriate.

### **RE: Vehicular Traffic and Safe Capacity on Local Beaches**

The Town of The Blue Mountains is one of Ontario's premier tourist destinations and, with the current desire for staycations we are being over-run by visitors from the GTA. This is causing issues in managing increased vehicular traffic and the safe capacity on our beaches. We have taken the position that as Ontarians we are all in this together and therefore from the beginning, we have been reluctant to ban visitors.

We in the Town of The Blue Mountains are doing our best to manage the situation. For example, we have hired 8 additional by-law officers for the summer. We will have a by-law staff of 13 for the summer, this for a community with a permanent population of 7,025, or the equivalent of the City of Toronto having a by-law staff in excess of 5,000.

These officers will manage parking, as well as safety and social distancing at our parks and beaches. This has already paid dividends as our by-law being present was instrumental in two successful water rescues carried out by our fire department in the last few weeks. We have had excellent cooperation from our OPP detachment as well.

We cannot manage the situation we find ourselves in alone and therefore we have two simple asks from your government, neither of which require funding, only quick action:

- 1) As an urgent safety matter, we ask the Province to temporarily reduce the speed limit on Highway 26 to 50 kmph from a point 300 m west of the entrance to Craigleith Provincial Park to the east end of the village of Craigleith, as is done for construction zones. With the large number of people crossing the highway on foot to access the waterfront and the heavier than normal traffic volume, it is almost a certainty there will be a fatality there in the near future.
- 2) Increase the amount of usable waterfront at Craigleith Provincial Park by cancelling campsites along the waterfront and converting the area to day use. We have very little usable beachfront and this would greatly alleviate the overcrowding on our beaches.

We look forward to your timely consideration of these two requests.
